HOUSE RULES HIGHLIGHTS

ADMINISTRATOR REVIEW



It is officially summer, and isn't it hard to believe the year is already half over with? And what a year it has been so far! I would like to encourage everyone to go outdoors to enjoy the sunshine. While many of us delight in the summer heat, please remember that it can pose certain dangers. To stay safe and healthy in sweltering temperatures, remember the following:



- (1) Drink plenty of fluids, especially water. Many heat-related conditions stem from dehydration.
- (2) Dress in light, loose-fitting clothing on hot days to stay comfortable.
- (3) If you begin to experience the symptoms of a heat stroke, such as confusion, a flushed face, and nausea, seek medical help immediately.

According to the CDC, adults over 65 do not adjust as well to changes in temperature. Make sure that you are resting enough, drinking enough, wearing lightweight clothing, and listening to your body for signs of heat stress. The heat isn't always a bad thing: it reminds us to slow down and take our time. Instead of rushing to our next task, we should instead try to be more like a summer afternoon; warm, patient, and restful. There is so much to be seen and enjoyed, if we just choose to be fully present in each moment.

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In The Spotlight Gil Raiford



When I moved into Friendship Terrace six years ago, one of the first residents I met was Gilbert Raiford. "Gil" as he is fondly known and his wife Mildred, had resided just a few years prior to mine.

Gil who was born and grew up in Zuber Florida is a mild-mannered individual with a commanding personality standing nearly seven feet tall.

As Gil and I became friends we got to know each other better and he asked me to take part in a Black History program he organized for Friendship Terrace residents. I eagerly accepted his invitation to participate. Who could refuse Gil!

Later I became President of the Friendship Terrace Residents Association and Gil's wife Mildred became Secretary. Mildred and I became cordial interfacing colleagues during our term on the Friendship Terrace Residents Association Council and subsequently the Raiford family and I formed a close relationship

In 2020, Gil wrote a book titled "The Marco Polo of Zuber Florida." In his book, Gil chronicled the places he visited and the various people he met during his travels.

Those individuals Gil met included: Muhammad Ali; Rock and Roll singer Frankie Lyman; comedians Redd Foxx and Richard Prior; jazz musicians John Coltrane and Thelonious Monk; historian Dr. John Hope Franklin; activist Dick Gregory; author James Baldwin; U.S. Attorney General Janet Reno; Founder of Walmart Sam Walton; Robert Johnson founder of Black Entertainment Television; and President Jimmy Carter. Gil and his wife Mildred were also invited to dine with Queen Elizabeth; during an event honoring the Queen.

Gil ends his book by stating "who would have thought he would go from working in the bean fields of Florida to teaching in some of the most prestigious universities in the nation? Who would have predicted that he would travel from Zuber to Paris, to London, to Rome, to Tokyo, to Sydney, and Moscow? Why were so many people favorably disposed to him? Why were so many life-threatening circumstances and situations thwarted? Why was he invariably navigated out of harm's way? The truth is, I honestly do not have a definite answer to any of these questions. I only know that my life has been comprised of unusual events. A life steeped in serendipity."


IN THE SPOTLIGHT PAGE
